



Heidi Victoria—'My Journey into Photography'

Heidi, who describes herself as 'A Camera for Hire' gave a very interesting and lively account of her pathway from Parliamentarian to the production of her beautiful book of photographs, entitled 'The Show Must Go On'.

Heidi spent 12 years in State Parliament, taking on roles such as Minister for Women's Affairs and Arts Minister. She was motivated by a desire to focus on languages and music in schools and was proud to make people sit up and take notice of the Arts. She pointed out how important Art can be in imparting knowledge from the past, such as indigenous cave paintings. Economically art is very important and in Australia there are over 130,000 people directly employed in the Arts industry.

After leaving Parliament in 2018, Victoria saw her future entailing a return to her profession as a photographer, utilizing her BA in Fine Arts (Photography), and went about setting up her business. With the advent of COVID in 2020, her business was in trouble and this was compounded in March when she suffered a stroke. The quick action of a friend in getting her to medical help meant that the damage was minimized but she still suffers the after effects. As she pointed out, 1.9 million brain cells

die each minute after a stroke, so speedy action is crucial.

Facing the reality of not being able to drive and not having an income, Heidi decided to use her skill of photography and her contacts within the Arts to document the impact of COVID on people within the Arts sphere. The result would be not only a commentary on the Arts and artists, but a political statement about the impact of COVID, which Heidi determined she would deliver to her Parliamentary contacts.

The book grew to encompass more than 70 artists, with evocative photographs and a statement from each artist about what they were doing to cope with the COVID situation and how it had impacted their lives.

The final product is a testament to the creativity that can emerge when there is time in a busy life. It is also a commentary on the impact of COVID in the Arts as very few artists received the Government support packages.

One moving example is of Ainsley Melham and Callum Francis, appearing in a photo Heidi titles 'From Broadway to Bathurst'.

Ainsley had appeared as Aladdin in the Melbourne production and was heading to Broadway for their production. They had sold everything, given up a lease on an apartment and then COVID hit—Broadway closed down. Rather than the bright lights of Broadway, this couple found themselves at Ainsley's family home in Bathurst.

Another stunning photograph is of Isaiah Firebrace, which captures so much about his recording and song writing, learning to meditate and exploring his identify as a Yorta Yorta man. This photograph was selected as a finalist in the 2021 National Photographic Portrait Competition, one of only 80 from 3200 entries

Heidi entertained us with many more stories of the evolution of this book, which a number of Club members purchased at the end of the meeting. Heidi is now working again as a photog-



rapher, doing corporate work and the occasional wedding. Her other passion is the part time work she does for the Stroke Foundation.

Our warm thanks to Heidi for making time available to attend our meeting and providing such an interesting presentation.

Kiriwina Island update—Alan Lunghusen

Alan gave an update on the Club Kiriwina Island project, for the benefit of new members and because some further action is needed.

He outlined the location of Kiriwina Island, in the Trobriand Island group, and the history of the project. The location is beautiful and the people are friendly, but their life is virtually Stone Age. Alan has visited 12 times and stayed with the locals for four months.


The project involved four elements:

- 1. providing hospital beds
- 2. improving the hospital water supply

- 3. providing 250 desks for schools. Alan taught locals how to build the desks on site.
- 4. building composting toilets for the schools which would enable the composted waste to be put to use as fertilizer.

These toilets were built in 2016 and have started to deteriorate through age and some vandalism. For example, the woven matting used for walls is starting to fall apart.

A monetary contribution will be needed to repair the damage and Alan will put a proposal to the Board to this effect. It is fortunate an item has been provided in the Club Budget for this contingency.

Rotarians Against Malaria is a volunteer-run organization working to eliminate malaria. The primary focus of RAM has been the distribution of insecticide-treated nets to vulnerable populations in Papua New Guinea, the Solomon Islands and more recently, Timor Leste. RAM has raised more than \$1.6 million to eliminate malaria since 2003. RAM works in conjunction with the Ministry of Health authorities in each country and complements the work of other malaria organisations, most notably the Global Fund to Fight AIDS, Tuberculosis and Malaria


