Page 3 Mentor Match—Domenic Saporito

In the midst of the COVID pandemic, the Victorian Government invited start-ups to come up with ideas to connect International students to community. A successful program that evolved from this was MentorMatch, initially under the auspices of Rotary District 9800.

This program matches international students, aged between 18-21, with a mentor for a three month program. It is not intended to find a job for the student; is a means to build social connectedness and to connect the students with a mentor who can guide them. Training is provided for both the

mentor and the student and there is no cost involved for the mentors. The aim is to meet up for various activities which can be on zoom or in person; it may be a visit to the footy or they may wish to help with a Bunnings BBQ or some other project. The frequency of the meetings is entirely up to the mentor and the mentee.

MentorMatch is promoted by Study Melbourne which outlines the benefits to students of joining MentorMatch as follows:

- Build social connectedness and a relationship with a mentor who can guide you.
- Gain wisdom and clarity on your life, career path, and how you can develop your career
- Grow your local network and get involved in your community
- Find a sense of belonging and establish yourself and your skills

Art Show 2022 Report—Rajeev Wadhwa

Highlights of the 2022 Art Show were:

- The number of participating artists increased by 6%
- The number of art works displayed increased by 10%
- The number of artworks sold was 10 (in 2020 in was 0)
- The number of schools participating was 5
- Sponsorship reduced by \$4000
- Awards given \$5400
- Profit was \$5400. This was down on the last two years profit but as these shows were both virtual, there was no venue hire involved.
 Venue hire for 2022 was \$5852.

Thanks to the contacts made through Jeff, this year it is likely that the Art Show will have a new venue at the Waverley Golf and Bowls Club, and there will be no venue hire. An increased profit should result from this decision.

The **Rotary Club of Ferntree Gully** has submitted an application and a project plan, which has been accepted, to the Dept of Justice and Empowering Communities project. The plan is to establish a "Youth Club" targeting high school students who lack opportunities due to financial, family or other situations. The students may have difficulties making connections, are disengaged or isolated from other young people, schools or the community, and may be vulnerable or at high risk. Students will be sourced from high schools in Knox.

The program is intended to start in second term 2023 and run 2024 (the grant is in excess of \$80.000.00) and will be held on a Friday nights, run fortnightly excluding school holidays.

A very brief overview of how an evening will be run for the students (capped at 45) would be:

- A hot wholesome meal on arrival
- 3-4 round robin activities & physical activity e.g., basketball, street dancing, etc
- A Life skills coaching session covering alcohol, drugs abuse and which can offer referrals for further assistance.
- Supper.

It will run from approx. 6.30-9.30pm at Fairhills High School.

The Grant covers (for approx. 20 sessions): fully qualified Life Skills Youth worker, qualified Youth worker, 2 Youth workers to coach and run activities, private catering and delivery of meals, bus transport home to ensure students safety, volunteer training, admin assistant for record keeping.

This project is to be a combined effort by the Knox Cluster clubs and is a major effort to assist the youth in the Knox area without the need to support the project with financial backing.

There is a lot of preparation required and a steering committee will be set up, which is meeting on Monday 20th March. This project is being led by Christine Anderson from the Rotary Club of Ferntree Gully. Christine will be visiting our Club on March 21st to give an update on the progress of this project.
