# Mornington Green Legacy Gardens—Lili Phoenix

Our speaker this week, Lili Phoenix provided thought-provoking information for us all.

Mornington Green Legacy Gardens aims to provide a green and sustainable alternative to a traditional burial. The site is 32 acres of garden which will eventually contain thousands of trees. The concept is that a client chooses a tree and a location. When the person passes away and is cremated, the ashes are treated with a scientifically derived formula to adjust the pH and hence detoxify the ashes. An additional ingredient turns the ashes into micro nutrients for the tree. A ceremony is held-an ash infusion- with the friends and family of the deceased present and in which they can participate. It is often obvious how much people let go of their grief during this process.

The appeal of Mornington Green to many clients is that there is a concept of the cycle of life—almost as if they live on in the tree. Most clients pre-plan and purchase a tree, from one of the 16 types of tree available, and the location for the tree. They can visit and watch the tree grow and are welcome to bring friends and family to enjoy the gardens and the facilities when they visit their tree.

Mornington Green provides a complete service which includes a celebrant, a plaque and refreshments in the Club House. Pets ashes can also be treated in the same way.

The concept at Mornington Green is to change the way we feel about death and about letting go and as the photo below shows, it is would

certainly be a beautiful place to visit.

Alan reported that **RAWCS** (Rotary Australian World Community Service) has started a Victorian flood relief fund to assist those recently affected by the flood situation in this state. This follows on from a Flood Relief Fund for NSW which recently raised \$780,000 from Clubs all around Australia. So far around \$500,000 of this has been distributed, largely through the provision of \$500 debit cards to impacted families. Further planning regarding the Victorian Flood Relief Fund will occur at the Zone 8 ANZPI Conference this coming weekend.

Alan also reported that he has had terrible news from **Kiriwina Island**, where a tribal war has broken out that has resulted in the deaths of 33 people and 15 people going missing. He is of the belief that none of the people with whom he



has worked over the years have been involved, but it is still very distressing to know that this can happen.

Carol reported that planning for the sale of **Christmas trees** is well underway. The trees will be sourced from a tree farm at Balnarring but it will require strong, fit people to do the collection of the trees as they will need to be lifted into the trailer. The price has increased this year and there is a lot of demand for trees. Selling will start the last weekend of November, so Club members will need to allow some time during this and successive weekends to be available on the sales roster.

President Kevin reminded us that October 24th was **World Polio Day** and stressed how important it is to keep supporting the Polio Plus campaign. If vaccination for polio ceased there would be 200,000 children per year impacted by polio within 10 years. It is concerning that evidence of polio have been picked up in sewage in various places, including New York, so there is still work to be done.

# **Project 'Shoe Toss'**


